## Facts About Us & the Work We've Done:

- During Sammie's Friends' first year of managing the Animal Shelter, 2000 animals have been placed.
- Sammie's Friends Animal Shelter has a euthanasia rate of just under one percent.
- In the 10 years since Cheryl Wicks went to the Shelter, over 4000 animals have received veterinary care from Sammie's Friends.
- In 2011 Sammie's Friends has spay/neutered over 300 feral cats in the community.

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## Iggy the Incredible!

**I**ggy first came into the lives of the Sammie's Friends staff back in October of 2010. A young lady from Nevada County found Iggy rummaging through a trash can on the streets of LA. She could see how thin Iggy was and saw the desperation in the dog's eyes. She enticed Iggy into her car with some leftover food she had in the car and Iggy's life was changed forever.

The young lady brought her to the shelter to inquire about getting Iggy spayed and some medical attention. The staff member noticed that Iggy had several cyst-like bumps on her head. An appointment was made for Iggy where she was spayed and the cysts were removed. The young lady hoped to keep Iggy but her roommates weren't as keen about the idea. They complained that Iggy was getting left alone for too many hours. The young lady tried to placate them by putting Iggy on a tether to keep her out of their way. Unfortunately, Iggy got ter-

ribly tangled on the tether and suffered a deep and painful cut to her back leg. The young lady called the shelter in tears and said things just weren't working out. Thus, Iggy came to live with us in February of 2011.

We all thought that Iggy would get adopted quickly. We knew she wasn't very good with cats and that she'd need a tall fence to keep her contained but we never imagined that those things would keep her at the shelter for six months! But that's how long we had our special little Iggy. Luckily we have a group of amazing volunteers and staff that were able to keep her sane in the kennel. Some of the volunteers really took a shining to her and took her on walks to Empire Mine. We contacted Greater California German Shepherd Rescue to see if they would take her but when they came to meet her they felt she would be too active for their program. Beverley Ward, our dog behaviorist, started working

with Iggy and before we knew it, her behavior had improved by leaps and bounds.

We contacted Greater California German Shepherd Rescue again in August. They came up to see Iggy and two other German Shepherds at the shelter. They were so impressed with the improvement that Iggy had made...we were all on pins and needles hoping that they'd give her a try. After an hour of playing in the side yard, the rescue lady came in and said, "Oh my goodness, we love Iggy, we'll take her!" And just like that our special Iggy was gone.

We got a call a week after Iggy left, the rescue people wanted us to know just how special Iggy was. We, of course, already knew how exceptional Iggy is. Sometimes they're here for a week, sometimes a month, sometimes even longer. No matter how long the stay, they all leave their paw prints on our hearts.

**Different Organizations, One Goal: Helping Our Animals**

I often hear comments like the following: "Why are there so many non-profits?" "Why do you all duplicate efforts?" "Why don't you all join together?"

We do not duplicate efforts for the most part. Each of us does something different to help the animals in this community.

Non-profits are not government agencies required to perform services.

Non-profits exist because an individual decided to create the non-profit to provide services for a specific purpose, something near and dear to the founder. We do all work together to help the animals. We are all in this for the same reason — to help the animals.

**AnimalSave** 

**AnimalSave** provides low-cost mobile spay/neuter services, a low-income supplemental pet food distribution program, a foster/adoption program, a cat room that provides housing for about 18 cats, and a re-homing assistance program for people who cannot keep their pets. **Pound Puppy Rescue** was founded in 2001 by Kathleen O'Sullivan. PPR is a volunteer run organization whose purpose is to keep puppies out of overcrowded shelters where they are at risk for disease and euthanasia. Puppies are fostered in volunteer foster homes where the puppies stay healthy, socialized, and in their litter until they are old enough to be placed in permanent, loving homes. All the rescued puppies come to PPR looking for love and a "forever" home. The hope is that all puppies placed through PPR will never experience being homeless or unloved again. **SCOOTER'S PALS**

**Scooter's Pals**, a volunteer organization, provides forever homes for abused or abandoned dogs scheduled to be killed in shelters. All rescues are vaccinated, spayed or neutered, provided vet care, and microchipped before adoption. Scooter's Pals also provides refundable pet deposits for dog and cat guardians needing help relocating, allowing them to keep their pets instead of placing them in shelters. **Rescue For Pets Sake** rescues mostly small dogs and occasionally large dogs if they can find a foster home. Rescue For Pets Sake takes in dogs rescued from various sources (shelters and individuals) who need a place to go and be safe and get adopted. Rescue For Pets Sake was founded by Pam Gorman in 2011. Pam also produces a television show called "For Pet's Sake" to give the homeless animals visibility and help them get adopted. Pam has produced this show for 20 years.

**Sammie's Friends** operates the Nevada County Animal Shelter under contract to the county since July of 2010. Sammie's Friends provides care for the many animals that come in as strays and have nowhere else to go. Nevada County Animal Control is responsible for law enforcement issues. Sammie's Friends has several other programs that are separate from running the animal shelter. Sammie's Friends provides veterinary assistance for sick and injured animals in the community that have no one to care for them and would otherwise be left to suffer or die. The horses of this community benefit from aid from Sammie's Friends horse fund. Any cat that needs to be spayed or neutered belonging to a person without the funds to pay for it will be paid for by Sammie's Friends. Sammie's Friends provides spay/neuter vouchers for spaying/neutering of dogs and cats for low income families. The shelter volunteer program was founded by Cheryl Wicks in 2001, Sammie's Friends was founded by Cheryl Wicks and Curt Romander in 2004 to pay for the medical care of the shelter animals. An extra giant thanks to Vici Downing whose vision, leadership and hardwork made this event possible!

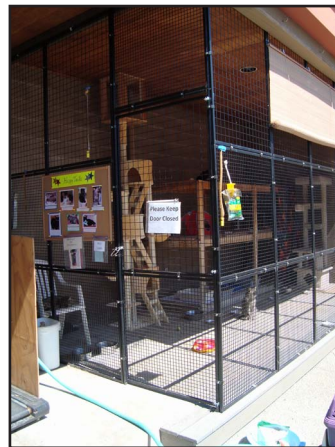
### Outside Kitty Enclosure

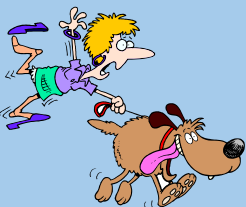

**Volunteer Spotlight**



While living in Germany, Rita's family had many animals which she took care of — chickens, rabbits, pigs and of course cats and dogs. Bob loved animals too. He flew several cats and dogs to new homes for Pilots and Pals and also Sammie's Friends.

Rita can't imagine life without animals. People sometimes say they don't want one because of the heartbreak when they die, but Rita thinks about all the years of companionship her animals have given her — waiting at the door when she comes home, purring and sleeping on her lap, cuddling up to her when she is sad. Her four rescue cats, Moni (14), Fritzie (13), Rudy (3), and Maximillian (2), have given her so much pleasure.

"I find it hard sometimes," says Rita, "especially when a favorite cat or dog waits too long for adoption, but I realize I cannot quit. The animals need us volunteers and when you see someone adopt an animal on your volunteer day, it makes it all worthwhile."

As far back as Dick Delisser can recall, except for short periods, he's always had a dog in his life (often along with other pets). He does not believe it's an exaggeration to say they have helped shape the person he is and have taught him lessons on living and loving.

After four years in the military during the Vietnam days, Dick took a job in Silicon Valley running a semiconductor manufacturing line. A few years later he accepted a position in Human Resources and spent the next 25 years in different HR functions, eventually running HR departments for a both high-tech and bio-tech companies. Along the way, he received his Masters and Doctorate degrees in Organizational Development.

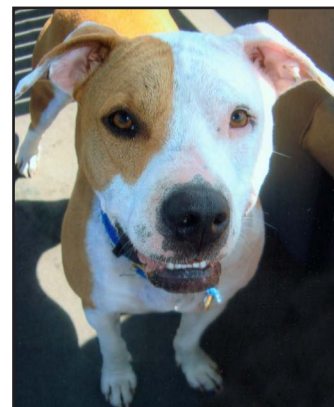
Dick became involved with the County Shelter about a year after moving here. He really didn't know much about it, but not having an animal at the

time, he wanted to do something with and for dogs. Dick soon learned about the volunteer program for walking dogs at the shelter, and shortly after began and has been a dog walker for six years, only missing one period when he had open heart surgery.

For Dick there are many benefits in walking the dogs at Sammie's Friends. The most important, though, would be his personal gift from the shelter — Maggie. She was a scrawny, pitiful, sick Pit Bull puppy with hardly any hair, an ear infection and kennel cough. "I had not intended to adopt a dog for a few more years," says Dick, "but we fell in love with this dog. Very briefly, Maggie had multiple fractures in her left wrist, had a metal plate with nine screws put in, had terrible infections, and has been 'through the mill.' Thankfully today she is fine, although

she'll always limp. She's up at 6:30AM every morning chasing geese from the Lake Wildwood beaches and parks, and goes swimming with me every evening. She's also won her AKC 'Canine Good Citizen' Award and is now a Therapy Dog allowed to go into hospitals, schools and nursing homes."

### Facing the Abandoned Horse Situation in Nevada County

Within the last year, Sammie's Friends has received some 28 horses. Most of these horses have ended up at the shelter after Animal Control has intervened and impounded them. Generally animals are impounded because they are being neglected or abused. The largest group of horses came from the Banner Lava Cap area. The elderly owners had become overwhelmed; their horses had been untouched for years and just kept on reproducing. There were eight stallions and four mares. These poor creatures had been living in 4-5 feet of mud in tiny 10x10 and 12x12 pens for the last

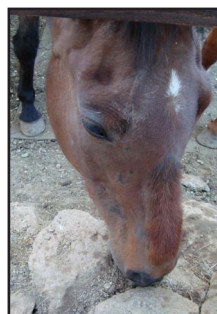
5-15 years of their lives. They were all thin, with rain-rot on their faces and bodies, overgrown feet, dreadlocked manes and horribly overgrown teeth.

Luckily, we have some amazing foster parents who have been working with these horses and settling them down. Several vets and a local foot-trimmer offered their services at a discount and we set about scheduling castration and veterinary dates. Amazingly, it only took a week or two for the horses to start looking healthy again. These beautiful animals are in dire need of a caring home. To provide an opportunity to adopt one of them, **there is an adopt-a-thon**

**scheduled for October 7th and 8th at The Farm Store located at 10110 Harvest Lane in Rough and Ready.**

We will be bringing several adoptable horses and informational flyers on the others.

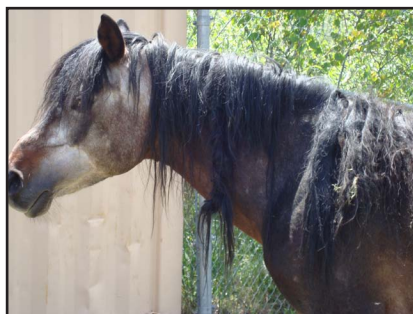

## Fleas Aren't Just Pests, They're Dangerous to Cats and Dogs

Fleas can be killers. It's true. A recent patient of mine actually died due to a severe flea infestation. He was a tiny kitten and had become so anemic from lost blood that we were unable to save him. While fortunately this is an unusual story, it prompts a discussion about fleas and best ways to avoid problems with this annoying parasite.

Traditionally Nevada County has enjoyed a less-than-most risk of flea problems. Perhaps due to our climate, altitude, rural lifestyle or some other reason, fleas just haven't been a big issue. This year, things are different. Many people are now seeing fleas on their pets. Most commonly, animals itch, especially around the rear half of the body. Fleas can be seen, although they are small and with a heavily coated animal, may be hard to spot. Flea dirt, or fe-

ces, can also be found. It looks like coffee grounds on the skin.

Most times flea infection is just annoying. However, more serious illness can be seen, usually skin infections and dermatitis. Fleas can transmit disease, from minor problems like tapeworms, to the more serious such as Bartonella or Yersinia pestis otherwise known as the Plague. These conditions can require additional treatment from your veterinarian or could even be fatal.

The good news is flea control is usually not difficult. Fleas cannot live as adults freely in the environment. They require a furry host in order to feed and reproduce. This gives us an excellent window of attack. Our modern flea products are much more effective than the pesticides of the past. Most have greatly reduced toxicity, are easier to use and work

extremely well. Applied to the skin monthly, they provide protection for the entire period, thus preventing the fleas from reproducing. Some oral products are now available that either provide for a quick kill of all fleas on the animal or provide monthly protection. The key to success is to provide protection to all animals in the household in order to remove any reservoir for fleas to hide. The environment should be treated, usually with frequent vacuuming and possibly the application of an insect growth regulator (IGR). Most times an environmental pesticide is not necessary. It may take several weeks or even a month to get all animals flea free in a household. It is very important that you only use products intended for cats on cats. A dog flea product could be extremely dangerous.

### Third Spay/Neuter Campaign

Sammie's Friends is running its third low cost/no cost campaign to encourage owners to spay/neuter their pitbulls.

The first campaign saw 69 pitbulls spayed and neutered in five days. The second campaign there were 15 spays/neuters.

This campaign titled "Don't Be A Turkey - Spay/Neuter Your Pitbull" will be run from November 7th to November 12th. For every pitbull a person has spayed/neutered they get to put their name in a hat for a drawing and the winner receives \$250.00.

**Nearly 1,000,000 pitbulls are euthanized every year** because there are no homes or them. The only way to protect these dogs is to stop the reproductive cycle. We are a long way from running out of pitbulls in America.

Please do the right thing and **spay/neuter your pitbull** and maybe win some money in the process!

### Whatever Happened to Teddy?

Teddy came to the shelter in July of 2003 as a LARGE two year old pit bull mix who had allegedly killed a cat. It was later determined that he did not kill a cat. The owner of the cat was located and she said that she still had the cat and Teddy had not killed the cat. Because of his alleged crime he was never taken out of quarantine and given the chance to be adopted. After six weeks he was scheduled to be euthanized.

Teddy had been dumped on someone's property when he was a five month old pup. The person who owned the property kept Teddy. She had him neutered and got him his shots. She had twenty acres that Teddy and her other dog, a small Australian Shepherd, ran free on in North San Juan. When Teddy was two, the owner and the two dogs moved to a trailer where the yard was tiny. Teddy was not a mean or vicious dog but he was a very big rambunctious dog. He knocked

over the other dog and this resulted in a torn cruciate and a big outlay of money. The owner was older with bad knees and felt that Teddy, in his exuber-



ance, would knock her down and hurt her. She brought him to the shelter.

Teddy was such a character with a great big personality, Cheryl couldn't bear to see him die. Cheryl took him home from the shelter to foster him until a home could be found. Cheryl and Curt had three other dogs, Sammie, Destiny and Mon-Mon, all of whom were signifi-

cantly smaller, so great caution was used in the introduction of so many other dogs. It all worked out fine. Eight years later Teddy still lives with Curt and Cheryl. Pretty sure he's not a foster dog anymore. Ha!

Over the years Teddy became less and less good with other dogs, with the exception of the three he lived with. However, the Sammie of Sammie's Friends died and so did Destiny. Both at ripe old ages. That left Teddy and Mon-Mon. Thanks to Beverley Ward, our dog behaviorist Teddy is now happily playing with other dogs at the animal shelter. He learned this at ten years old. It is never too late to get help for your doggie if there are problems. Humans can learn until they are very old and so can dogs.

Curt and Cheryl would not have traded the last eight years with their Teddy dog for anything. He's been a lot of fun and very entertaining.

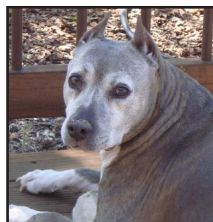
We are so grateful to all of them for their generosity.
