Fact's About Us and the Work We've

Done:

- The NCAS Volunteer Program currently has over 100 volunteers helping to socialize dogs and cats.
- In 2007, the NCAS had a euthanasia rate of 2% due to our activities.
- In the 5 years since the creation of Sammie's Friends, over \$131,000 has been spent on animal care.

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2007: A Year of Changes

It's been a year of change for Sammie's Friends and the NCAS Volunteers. From the death of Sammie, the inspiration for our wonderful work (see memorial below), to changes in our leadership structure, this year has proven a challenge!

Thankfully, we are blessed with so many talented and giving volunteers and we've risen to the occasion. Our new "look" is actually a three pronged organizational concept that allows us to provide all the same services to the animals by distributing the related responsibilities to a larger group of volunteers. The first group, or "prong" is devoted to coordinating the volunteers who work daily at the shelter. The second prong is dedicated to Animal Placement-- from fostering,

to finding homes for the more challenging animals. The final group, "Sammie's Friends", raises and manages funds to pay for veterinary care for the animals at the county shelter. The three groups provide all the same services we extended to the animals under the old umbrella title of "Sammie's Friends", but avoids placing on just one or two volunteers the backbreaking level of responsibilities that Cheryl and Curt maintained for so long. Speaking of Cheryl and Curt, they continue playing an active part in our new look by leading the Sammie's Friends arm of the organization. This allows them to continue in the mission that means so much to us all; helping the animals in the community.

Another change related to our new look; what to call ourselves? In the old world, saying "I'm a Sammie's Friends volunteer" covered the gamut. Now, with the organization separated into three groups with clearly defined roles, it's no longer accurate. A volunteer who works to raise funds may not volunteer at the shelter or vice versa. Sammie's Friends is now a branch of a greater whole that includes animal placement and shelter volunteers. To avoid confusion, from this point onward ALL volunteers will be collectively known as "**Team Sammie**".

The final change to mention is this quarterly newsletter. Long time volunteers may remember that the Poop Scoop existed before as *(Continued on page 3)*

Tater was part of a litter we fostered from the NCAS in the fall of 2006. He was the runt of the litter and appeared to have been born with some sort of birth defect, perhaps even the kitty version of Downs Syndrome. His head was HUGE in com-

parison to his tiny body and his forehead was quite prominent and sloping. His eyes were very large, round and flat and he had a serious oozing eye infection. He was so odd looking, even his littermates ignored him!

As a foster parent to a shelter animal, Sammie's Friends automatically picked up the tab for Tater's vet visits. We were able to clear up his eyes and perform some tests that concluded that while

Tater will never be brilliant, he's clever enough to figure out the basics. Today, he's grown bigger than his sister (who we also kept) and though still large, his head is more in proportion. He'll always have a perpetually startled look, but everyone loves and remembers Tater!

We're so grateful he came into our lives, and are thankful that Sammie's Friends exists to provide similar opportunities to others!

It's a Dog's Life (and a Cat's Too!) by Dr. Rob Avery

Dr Rob Avery of "For the Love of Pets" has graciously consented to contribute a recurring column to our newsletter. For the Love of Pets is a veterinary office in Grass Valley that performs many of the exams and procedures on Sammie's Friends animals.

Heartworm infection is common in Nevada County and is a real danger for dogs in this area. Infection occurs following a mosquito bite. The bite transfers the larval heartworm which then migrates through the dog's body, eventually ending in the heart after about 6 months. Once in the heart the larva finishes its growth and develops into a mature worm that then begins to reproduce. The microfilaria offspring of the worms are then transferred to feeding mosquitoes continuing the lifecycle. One reason heartworms are so common in our area is the very high incidence of infection in our resident coyote population.

Prevention of this disease is

easy and should be year round. Many prescriptions are effective, including Heartgard, Interceptor, Iverheart and Revolution, and are available from your veterinarian. These medications are given once monthly and are very safe. They only prevent the developing worms however, and are not effective in killing the adult worms once infection has taken hold. These drugs can safely be given to heartworm positive dogs, contrary to previously available preventions.

Your veterinarian will perform regular screening for heartworms with a simple blood test. If a dog becomes positive, treatment is possible but can be expensive and is sometimes dangerous. Signs of heartworm infection include tiredness, cough, vomiting and loss of appetite. Severe cases can result in abdominal bloating, hemorrhage in the lungs and death. Early treatment is always best and provides the best prognosis. Veterinarians can offer you a vari-

ety of tests to confirm the infection and provide the safest treatment. These include chest X-Rays and blood and urine testing.

It is not uncommon for an owner to forget to give their pet its heartworm prevention for a period of time. If for two months or less, simply start your pet back on prevention and then let your veterinarian know at your next visit. If the gap has been for a longer period, call your veterinarian for advice- most times you can restart the medication immediately, but may need additional heartworm testing.

Cats can get heartworms too. Infection is less common than with dogs but diagnosis and treatment can be trickier. Signs include cough and vomiting. Blood testing is available to help with a diagnosis. Treatment varies but usually consists of management of symptoms instead of cure. Prevention is available similar to that for dogs.

Adoptathon 2007

On Saturday, May 5, 2007, the fourth annual Adoptathon was held at the Nevada County Animal Shelter. Timed to coincide with the National Adopt a Pet Week, numerous Team Sammie volunteers were on hand to help needy animals find new homes, and to raise money for Sammie's Friends.

This year's Adoptathon was again organized by Team Sammie volunteers Barbara Graves, Mary Kranz, Veronica Furman and Marge Parkin. Also present were representatives (and their four legged pals), from Animal Save, Chow-Chow Rescue, and Wee Wonders. Pam Gorman and a camera crew from NCTV11 filmed portions of the event for an episode of "For Pet's Sake". A brisk and blustery wind somewhat hampered set up early on, but calmed as the day progressed, allowing all to enjoy a sunny spring day.

The event proved a rousing success this year. Raffle ticket sales totaled

\$1931.00, bake sale goods, and the sale of hot dogs brought in \$265.00, and donations received both in advance of and on the day of the Adoptathon were \$747.50, making a total for Sammie's Friends of \$2943.50!! This is almost

Thirteen dogs and two cats from the NCAS, two pups from Animal Save, two chows from Chow Chow Rescue and three dogs from Wee Wonders all found new loving homes. Twenty-two animals matched with new families on a sunny Saturday is certainly a good day's work!

With all members of the organizing committee suffering from some sort of infirmity on this day, and labeling themselves "The Walking Wounded", Barbara, Mary, Marge and Veronica were ecstatic with the day's results. It's a huge amount of work to coordinate an event like this, but with results like those achieved on Saturday it is well worth the effort. A huge thanks to the organizing committee, the local business sponsors who donated raffle prizes, to the Team Sammie volunteers who participated, and to all the attendees for making Adoptathon 2007 the most successful yet!

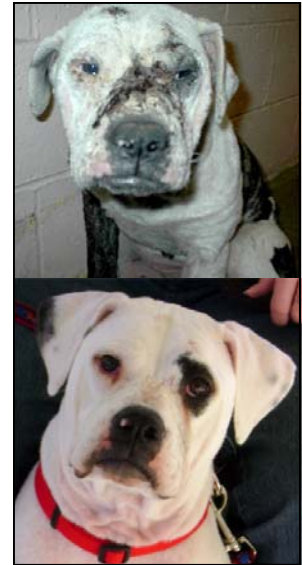
Spring 2007 Success Story: Meet Bella!!!

Nevada County Sheriff's Department Honors Cheryl Wicks

On Monday, April 23, 2007, the Nevada County Sheriff's Department presented Sammie's Friends Co-Founder, Cheryl Wicks, with a Citizens Appreciation Award for all her hard work in aiding the animals of Nevada County. The ceremony, held in the Board of Supervisors Chambers at the Eric Rood Center had a large audience filled with many of Ms Wicks fellow volunteers. In presenting the award, Sheriff Keith Royal praised Ms Wicks efforts and the incredibly low euthanasia rates at the Nevada County Animal Shelter that were a direct result of those efforts.

In her comments, Ms Wicks confirmed that the euthanasia rate at the shelter had

been as high as 68% in the late 1990's and that through the work of the volunteer program, it was now 2%. This translates to approximately 6000 animals that have been placed since the inception of the volunteer

program at the Nevada County Animal Shelter.

Telling Sheriff Royal she couldn't accept the award strictly on her own as she had simply provided "organization and focus" Ms Wicks accepted the award on her own behalf, as well for as for the hundreds of volunteers who had helped make this possible. She also offered sincere thanks to her partner and Sammie's Friends co-founder, Curt Romander, and also heartfelt gratitude to the inspiration behind it all, Sammie, Cheryl and Curt's shar-pei.
